Comments from your City Administrator Jeana L. Woods, CPA, ICMA-CM

As City staff prepare for the upcoming FY2022 Operating Budget, I am pleased to report the City's financial situation remains positive. Sales tax collections and other revenue sources remain up over last year and capital investment into our City for the current year continue on schedule, with many projects completed. The City's cash reserves are healthy and on target with the City's reserve policy, a key attribute of a financially stable organization. A strong reserve position allows the City to weather economic downturns, manage changes in revenue flows, maintain the capital needs of the departments, and to effectively address unexpected emergencies.

In the upcoming months, the City is expected to receive ARPA funds to allow the City to respond to related effects due to the recent public emergency. The ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act, 'the Act') signed into law by President Biden on March 11, 2021, includes relief funds to cities, towns, and villages in the United States for specific uses including investments in infrastructure, pay for essential workers, replacement of lost revenue, and expenditures to address negative economic and public health impacts caused by the public health emergency. We have completed the application process and are awaiting receipt of funds from the State of Missouri Office of Administration. The Act requires appropriation of funds by the City for approved uses through December 31, 2024, and planning for said funds with the Mayor, Board of Aldermen, and staff will begin soon.

We are dedicated to being good stewards of our community and will continue to operate efficiently to deliver superior municipal services to our citizens and visitors.

I hope you find value in the City's newsletter. In addition, the City provides a lot of information on our **website**, including Board meeting activity, official City statements, and my office's report to the Board of Aldermen each month which can be found **HERE**.

From the Osage Beach Police Department.....

As summer draws to an end we will see school starting, and with that brings school busses and children being out and about on and near the roadways.

Please watch out for slowing and stopping busses. When you see the yellow and red flashing lights on the school busses, it means that the bus is getting ready to slow down and stop to pick up or drop off children.

When this occurs be on the look out for children. They are instructed to only cross the street in front of the bus, however we all know that children have a mind of their own and anything is possible.



When approaching a school bus with flashing lights and displaying a stop sign remember these important things:

- Traffic on a two-lane roadway must stop in both directions for a school bus displaying flashing red lights and a stop sign.
- Traffic on a four-lane or more roadway going in the same direction as the school bus must stop for a school bus displaying flashing red lights and a stop sign,
- Traffic going the opposite direction as the school bus on a roadway with four or more lanes does not have to stop for a school bus displaying flashing lights and a stop sign.
- Upon stopping you must remain stopped until the bus moves or the bus driver signals you to proceed.
- After stopping for a school bus that is unloading children, watch for children walking along side the roadway.

THE DANGERS OF WORKING CONSTRUCTION IN THE HEAT

When it comes to working construction in the summer heat, the two most significant risks to be aware of are **HEAT STROKE** and **HEAT EXHAUSTION**.



HEAT STROKE

Heat stroke is a condition that occurs when your body is exposed to excessively high temperatures, to the point that your body's natural temperature regulating mechanisms fail, causing fever or even loss of consciousness. Put simply, heat stroke means your body has overheated and isn't able to cool itself down like it normally would. Symptoms that might indicate heatstroke include:

- · A core temperature of 104 degrees Fahrenheit or more
- Confusion, agitation, slurred speech and delirium
- · Change in sweating patterns
- Vomiting and nausea
- Red skin
- Rapid heart rate
- Headaches

HEAT STROKE

Heat exhaustion is a milder version of the same condition as heat stroke. It is also caused by your body becoming overheated to the point where it can't figure out how to cool itself down. However, the symptoms are typically less severe, and the risk is not as high. Don't be too quick to dismiss this condition as a non-threat, however, as heat exhaustion can easily turn into heat stroke if it is ignored and left untreated.

Symptoms that indicate the start of heat exhaustion include:

- Cool skin with goosebumps despite the heat
- Intense sweating
- Fainting, dizziness and fatigue
- · Rapid, weak pulse
- Low-blood pressure
- Muscle cramps
- Nausea & Headaches
