CLASS OF 2025 ALDERMEN SEATED; NEW BOARD PRESIDENT SELECTED

Three newly elected Aldermen for the City of Osage Beach took the oath of office during the Regular Board of Aldermen Meeting on April 17, 2025, at Osage Beach City Hall. Following the swearing-in, the newly seated Board unanimously selected Alderman Bob O'Steen as the new Board President.

The Class of 2025 includes incumbent <u>Aldermen Justin</u> <u>Hoffman</u> (Ward 2), Bob O'Steen (Ward 1), plus

newcomer <u>Alderman Rebecca Collins</u> (Ward 3). Hoffman and O'Steen retained their seats during the April 8, 2025 Osage Beach Municipal Election, while Collins unseated Board President and incumbent Alderman Richard Ross.

BOARD SUPPORTS COMMUNITY HEALTH

Osage Beach Mayor Michael Harmison and Ward 2 Alderman Justin Hoffman lent their support to Lake Regional Health System's federal funding request for a new linear accelerator at the Osage Beach facility.

The accelerator is an advanced medical device used to deliver targeted, high-energy radiation therapy to cancer patients. This technology allows for more precise and effective treatment, reducing damage to surrounding healthy tissue and improving patient outcomes.

Harmison and Hoffman joined in a letter writing campaign urging congressional leaders to award Lake Regional's Community Project Funding request. The hospital, located in Ward 2, serves a diverse, growing population from retirees to residents in rural areas.

FALLEN OFFICER PHYLICIA CARSON HONORED LOCALLY & STATEWIDE

The legacy of Osage Beach Police Officer Phylicia Carson was honored at both the local and state levels in recent weeks.

At the State Capitol in Jefferson City, on Saturday, May 3, <u>Ofc. Carson's name was added to the Missouri Law Enforcement Memorial Wall of Honor</u>. Her name was added along with those of five other fallen officers.

Osage Beach Police Chief Todd Davis, Lt. Michael O'Day, Det. Sgt. Brian Salerno, Sgt. Joel Shelton and Cpl. Pete Leyva participated in the ceremony.

Locally, The Pancake House on Osage Beach Parkway dedicated a memorial sign over her family's favorite corner table. Osage Beach Police Department officers were invited to the occasion.

Ofc. Carson was killed in August 2024 while assisting another officer in a vehicle pursuit.

GOLF CART SAFFTY REMINDERS



Golf cart drivers are permitted to operate on most Osage Beach streets with a posted speed limit of 30 mph or less. However, golf carts are prohibited on the following roads:

- Nichols Road (between Osage Beach) Parkway and Dude Ranch Road)
- Passover Road (between Osage Beach Parkway and Parkwood Circle)
- Bluff Drive (between Osage Beach Parkway and Sunset Drive)

Additionally, golf carts are not allowed on federal, state, or county highways, except when crossing at intersections where the speed limit is 45 mph or less.

Equipment Requirements

Golf carts on Osage Beach streets must have headlights and taillights (if used at night), a mirror, parking brake, horn, and specific red reflectors. It also needs a bright triangular

bicycle safety flag that stands at least 7 feet above the ground (it may make you look like a Mario Kart character, but it's necessary so that other drivers can see you).

Driver Rules & Restrictions

Drivers must have a valid driver's license and maintain proper insurance as required by Missouri law. You may not drive faster than 20 mph, operate while impaired by drugs or alcohol, and devices must remain hands-free. Hand signals are required unless the cart has turn signals and brake lights.

PUBLIC WORKS: WATER DEPARTMENT



Tommie Stouffer shows Kevin Hamel how to pull samples. Each month, the Public Works Water Department carefully checks water samples to make sure everything's up to standard. Five Bac-T samples are taken from different spots—two on the west side of town and three on the east side. The locations are rotated each month to ensure the entire system is being monitored properly.

Only certified water technicians are allowed to take these samples, as

required by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. That means they've gone through training and passed a test to show they know their stuff when it comes to disinfectants and water distribution.

In fact, there are multiple things our Water Techs must know, like learning proper tie-downs, which really matter when working with heavy equipment (and are required by DOT).

PUBLIC WORKS: NOTES FROM THE FIELD

- The Public Works crew has been hard at work this month as they tackle spring cleaning tasks like road striping, mowing, clearing easements, and sewer maintenance. Please watch out for our crews working along the roadside.
- When water outages occur, an automated phone call alert is sent out to the primary phone number listed on your account. If you need to update your account information, call the Utility Billing Clerk at (573) 302-2000 x1034. Changes cannot be made online.
- So far, we've doled out 300 to 400 tons (yes, TONS) of compost at the Public Works Facility. The free compost is all organic, made from leaves collected each fall around town. Come get some during regular business hours, 7 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday Friday. Our facility is located at 5757 Chapel Drive.

ANNUAL BACKFLOW INSPECTIONS REQUIRED

Keep an eye out for a courtesy <u>backflow inspection</u> letter from Public Works. These **inspections are** required each year by <u>Missouri DNR</u> to ensure backflow prevention devices are functioning properly for customers who have irrigation systems and dock-supplied water lines. These devices play a crucial role in preventing chemicals and lake water from contaminating the water supply. The City does not perform these inspections; they must be conducted by <u>Certified Backflow Inspectors</u>.
