GOVERNOR KEHOE RECOGNIZES OSAGE BEACH AS A MISSOURI BLUE SHIELD CITY

The City of Osage Beach is proud to announce it has officially received the Missouri Blue Shield designation from the Missouri Department of Public Safety.

This honor, launched by Governor Mike Kehoe in January 2025 as a part of his Safer Missouri initiative, recognizes communities that demonstrate an exceptional commitment to reducing crime, investing in public safety, and fostering strong partnerships between law enforcement and the public.

Osage Beach joins a select group of cities and counties across Missouri recognized for going above and beyond to keep their communities safe, while building meaningful, lasting relationships with those who serve and protect.

This designation reflects our ongoing efforts to prioritize safety and strengthen trust throughout the community. By working collaboratively with local law enforcement agencies, stakeholders, and residents, the city has implemented impactful initiatives aimed at both preventing crime and enhancing public engagement.

As a designated Blue Shield community, Osage Beach will receive access to state grant funding for law enforcement training and equipment.

NOW OPEN: DRAGON HATCHERY DISC GOLF COURSE + SAND VOLLEYBALL COURTS

The Dragon Hatchery Disc Golf Course at City Park (950 Hatchery Road) is now open!

The new course currently features 5 hillside holes, with plans to eventually expand to 9 holes. Tee 1 is located near City Park Pond. It's free to play, but you must bring your own discs.

The twin sand volleyball courts by the pond are newly reopened for play, thanks to Lake of the Ozarks Volleyball volunteers. They cleaned up the area, donated materials, and installed new nets. We appreciate their passion!

In addition, Parks & Recreation and Public Works crews spread 80 tons of sand and added rocks to improve drainage and added a water line to wet the sand.

A new Public Works Director has joined the City of Osage Beach. Mayor Michael Harmison formally appointed Jeffrey Fisher to the position during the May 16, 2025, Regular Board of Aldermen Meeting at Osage Beach City Hall.

All present Aldermen approved Fisher's appointment (Alderman Phyllis Marose was absent and did not vote). Fisher's career in local government spans more than two decades.

He was most recently employed with the Kansas City, Missouri, Public Works Department.

Fisher's previous experience includes Public Works Director for the Unified Government of Wyandotte County and Kansas City, Kansas, and the municipalities of Belton, Missouri and Grain Valley, Missouri. Fisher was sworn in immediately following the meeting by City Clerk Tara Berreth.
